A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Like to explain or something?

STEVE: Yeah, I might say, 'Well, what does that

mean?' or 'Can you tell me?'

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yeah.

STEVE: And so that's that one really. If I ask

you a question and you don't know the answer, that's fine. Just tell me you don't know, okay? And that's because I want you to tell everything the truth, okay? I don't want you to guess. If you

don't know, just tell me, okay?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: No, alright.

STEVE: And that leads onto the next thing: we must

tell the truth, and that's you and me. So if I ask you something, you've got to tell me the truth, and if you ask me something,

I'll tell you the truth. Shall we agree that, shall we? Yeah? What I want to do

is just make sure you understand the

difference between truth and a lie, okay?

I've got this paper-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Truth is, oh no sorry, it's just opposite.

STEVE: Truth is what?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Truth is opposite.

STEVE: Opposite to what?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Well, lie is opposite truth.

STEVE: Lie is opposite to the truth. So, right,

if I tell you this: If I've drawn this

picture here.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes.

STEVE: This is on Cleo's paper. She sees this

picture, and she says, 'Who drawn that?' I said, 'Yes, it was me that drew it, I'm sorry.' Would that be the truth or a lie?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: That would be truth.

STEVE: That would be the truth. So what would

have been a lie?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: 'No, I did not draw it or somebody else, I

don't know who.'

STEVE: That would be a lie, yes. So why do

sometimes people tell the truth, sorry,

tell the lie? Why do sometimes people tell

a lie?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: So because, maybe, sometimes they do, maybe

it's personal, I don't know.

STEVE: What do you mean?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: So, maybe, like if, I don't know. Why

would they say a lie?

STEVE: Yeah, why would they say a lie?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Maybe they don't want you to know about

that.

STEVE: Yeah, sometimes they, yeah, they don't want

to tell you about it, yeah.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Maybe they don't want to be in trouble,

they don't want anyone to be in trouble.

STEVE: That's also a good reason that, sometimes,

people lie, that's true, that people don't want to get in trouble. And in here you

won't get in trouble. Okay? As long as

you tell the truth you will not get in

trouble for anything you've said or done.

Okay? As long as you tell us now. Okay,

I've got to tell the truth as well. And from that, I need to say that that includes if you use rude words or things like that. In here, you're allowed to use those rude words, okay? Your mummy knows what we're going to be talking about, and knows that you're here, and she won't tell you off if you need to use those sort of words. I'd rather you use those rude words to tell me exactly what happened than try and make it polite, and you miss out things that have happened.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Sorry, I don't understand.

STEVE: Well, say for example, me and Cleo are

having a conversation, and you heard Cleo

swear.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes.

STEVE: Right, do you understand that bit?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yeah.

STEVE: So me and her are talking, Cleo swore while

she was talking to me, she said a rude

word. And then I say to you, 'Did you hear

what Cleo said?' and I say, 'Tell me what

Cleo said.' I'd rather you tell me

everything, including the swear word-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: So I should say the swear word?

STEVE: Yeah, say like I said, Cleo said, 'Oh, this

camera's shit.' Say she said that. And I say to you, 'What did Cleo say?' I don't

want you to say, 'Oh, Cleo said that the

camera's rubbish,' I want you to say, 'Cleo

said that the camera was shit.'

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Oh.

STEVE: Do you see?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yeah, so I should [inaudible].

STEVE: So don't try and make it polite-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes.

STEVE: Say exactly. Is that clear?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yeah so I should say it like exactly.

STEVE: Exactly. Perfect. Well done, thank you.

So you've come here with your mum, and do

you live with your mum, do you?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yeah, I live with her.

STEVE: And who else do you live with?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Well, that's just my mum I live with. Only

my mum. It's just-

STEVE: No one else?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: No.

STEVE: No other family in your house?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: I don't live with my dad, no.

STEVE: What about brothers?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Nope. I live with my brother Gabriel.

STEVE: So there's you, Gabriel, your mum-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes, and we are three.

STEVE: Three of you?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes.

STEVE: Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: And my big brother, James, he sometimes

comes.

STEVE: Oh okay, and who is James?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: James is just my big brother but he's not

really like, he knows this about this but

no, he doesn't really like doing it.

STEVE:

What do you mean, sorry?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

When my big brother, James-

STEVE:

Yeah, James, how old is James?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: He's about 17 but he doesn't, he doesn't,

he's not, he doesn't, he's not really included because he doesn't really live

with us.

STEVE:

Oh okay. So where does he live?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

But he, he lives with his, his, like, other

dad.

STEVE:

Oh okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

He doesn't live with us but he comes to

visit us on Saturdays.

STEVE:

Oh I see so is he your half-brother is he?

Is he your half-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

No, he is my brother. He is my brother.

STEVE:

Right.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

But it's just that his dad is married to,

so my mum married two men so first is when

my big brother was born, and after she

broke up with, his name is Will-

STEVE:

Yeah.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

She broke up with him, and then after she

didn't marry, she like, she loved Ricky which is my dad so then we were born so

then she broke up.

STEVE:

I've got it. So your dad is Ricky, James'

dad is Will?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Will. Will Draper, and my mums name is

Ella Draper.

STEVE: And, but you and James both have the same

mum who's Ella, yeah?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes, yes.

STEVE: Understand. And what about Gabriel?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Gabriel, he's my brother, yes.

STEVE: And is he the son of Will or is he the son

of Ricky?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Son of Ricky, me and Gabriel are the

daughter and son of Ricky and James is the

son of Will.

STEVE: Perfect. So you live with your mum?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes.

STEVE: And do you ever get to see your dad, do

you?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: My dad, Ricky?

... STEVE: Ricky, do you ever get to see him?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes, yes. Every two Saturdays I do but,

actually, in fact, he lies to my mum, and

he says that he just sees us every two

Saturdays.

STEVE: And do you see him every two Saturdays?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: And the court orders said that-

STEVE: Okay. Do you see him every two Saturdays?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Nope, we see him every single day.

STEVE: Every single day, and how do you do that?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: At school. He comes to our school.

STEVE: Oh does he? What does he do at the school?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: He does sex to us; he kills babies there.

STEVE: Right.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: We eat babies. We drink their blood.

STEVE:

Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Because this is how we do it so they, on

Wednesdays, Wednesdays is doing the most

special busiest day, special day.

STEVE:

Right, okay. We'll start, we'll take it

little bit by little bit so you say your

dad comes to your school every day?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes.

STEVE:

What does that mean? He comes to your

school every day?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: So that

So that means he comes whenever we are at

school, and Saturdays he comes and see us

there.

STEVE:

Whereabouts does he come and see you?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

My school, Christchurch Primary School.

STEVE:

Yeah, okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

That's where we, the area we live next to

Christchurch Primary School.

STEVE:

Yeah.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Because we live in 5 Patterson Road, and

after he comes to our school.

STEVE:

Okay, so who drops you off at school in the

morning?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

My mum.

S [UNKNOWN]

So you get dropped off at school?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes.

STEVE:

When you get dropped off at school, what do

you do then?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

So then they check if the coast is clear

for my mum, and mum's not there or anything

around the area so Mr Morris, the

caretaker, he goes around the school, the school areas, and checks if my mum is there or anything, like if the coast is clear, and after they call my dad and say that everything's alright, my mum is not there, they say all clear.

STEVE:

How do you know that?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Because they've got the number of my dad.

STEVE:

And how do you know that?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Because I heard them talking to my dad.

That was exactly my own dad's voice,

exactly.

STEVE:

So where were you when you heard this

caretaker speaking to your dad?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Staffroom, staffroom.

STEVE:

Why were you in the staffroom?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Because that's where they do sex to me but-

STEVE:

So you've got to school, you've got to

school, how do you get to school?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

So we just go by car there.

STEVE:

So you go by car with your mum?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes. Yes.

STEVE:

Get to the school?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes.

STEVE:

So you get out of the car, and where do you

go first of all?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

So this is where we park, and there's this

little path, we go upstairs and there's

this little path, and then then here's our

school.

STEVE:

Yeah.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Then you just walk in but that's where the infants are, you have to go further along and then that's where the junior are because I'm in junior so then when you go in the junior there's downstairs, and then there's a big play ground, and then there's just the office, and the whole school there.

STEVE:

Okay. So you go into the school, in the infant's part, and you walk round to the primary part-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes. Yeah, so at the front. When you just come in the room, there's just the office, just at the front, there's a door going in the hallway where we do assembly, and on the right, no, on the left, you go and then there's the headmistress' office there, and then the staff toilet, and there's just this, like, where the teachers go and do the typing work. And there's upstairs, there's year four and year five.

STEVE:

Yeah.

A GAREEVA-DEARMA

And after, I'm in year four so in year four that's just there and then year five is there on that side, and the staffroom is just at the front of us.

STEVE:

Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

So you just walk in the staffroom, and then there's just, there's just a kitchen, and then there's a sofa, and that's where we do sex.

STEVE:

Okay. So why do you go in there first of

all, why don't you just go to class?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

No, we go to class sometimes too, yes.

STEVE:

Right, so-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

We go to class sometimes.

STEVE:

Right so, okay. So you go to class, okay,

and then what happens when you go to class?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

And then they've got this, in my class when

they've got this little door at the back,

right at the back of the classroom-

STEVE:

Yeah.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

They've got a little door, and it's just in there, a tiny little room, it's all stuffed with sweets, prizes, especially to pay the children with sweets to do sex to them.

STEVE:

Right.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yeah, so they give sweets as much as they like so they give sweets so till they're, like, full they're done so they because while they eat the sweets they do sex to them. So they pay them sweets, and then after-

STEVE:

I understand that.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

-they do what they want them to do.

STEVE:

Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Because they will, because all of the

children-

STEVE:

Who? What children? What children?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

So there's children from our school, 200

children in our school, there's not like

all, there's 20 special children.

STEVE:

Okay, so what ones? Tell me, who are these

20 special children?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

There's Milly, she's a brown girl.

STEVE:

Milly who?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Milly Cowell[?].

STEVE:

Milly Cowell.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes.

STEVE:

Okay. So how do you know she's one of the

20 special children?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Because she is, because I know because she

comes and they do sex to her mostly.

STEVE:

Who's they?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

The teachers, the parents, the staff.

STEVE:

Every single teacher or specific teachers?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

No, every single, the whole school does it.

The whole school, and we've got our own

church-

STEVE:

Yeah.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

as I said, we kill babies, we drink their blood, we eat them but then after we, so the Social Services who are in it, they say they go to families so if the families can't afford, so they've got a baby but they can't look after it or anything, they can't buy food or they can't buy clothes, they can't look after it so they sell, the families who sell their children to the Social Services get them, they say they get them from foster homes but they don't, they get the babies or the children, and then

they, then they put, they get Miss
Marden[?] our nurse in our school, she
injects the child or baby in the neck, just

here though.

STEVE: Right, okay, and how do you know that?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Because I saw her doing it, I saw her doing

it.

STEVE: How did you see her doing it?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Because I saw her in the staffroom. She

was getting this, there's this, so she got this injection, and she done, so the baby was there it was just sitting on the table-

STEVE: Right.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: I was just laughing there, and then after

she just injected her, and I was just like,

it was just like, I was like, it slowly went to sleep, and there was just like a thud, not like just fell straight away, they just, they put, because there was girls like, it looked like, it was slowly

moving down like that.

STEVE: Right, okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yeah, so then after-

STEVE: So this baby's gone to sleep. And then

what happened?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes, and then after they put her on this

[inaudible] get the baby, they hang it

upside down-

STEVE: And how do they hang it upside down?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: And, yes, with a string.

STEVE: From where?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

On the wall because there's this little like, it's a screw, and they put a string, it's like a circle string, tie it to the legs, hang it upside down, and then they get a special, the knife they use for cutting the baby's head off so, you know those big big ones like those big Chinese ones which you chop up coconut and stuff-

STEVE:

Yeah, right.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yeah, so they get, cleavers aren't they?

No, I don't know what they're called.

STEVE:

You've described it well enough. That's

fine. Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes. So then because our dad, he forces me and Gabriel to do it but because can't, we're not strong enough to cut the baby's head off, he asked us to hold the knife, and he puts his hand on the top of our hand, and he helps us to cut the baby's head off because he is learning, he's teaching me and Gabriel so when we're older to do it to our own children, and do this kind of stuff to our own children.

STEVE:

And where is it this happens?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

The church, in the kitchen in our church.

STEVE:

The kitchen in the church, okay. So-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes, they've got, yes.

STEVE:

-right, this string. Tell me about this

string?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

So it's just like, it's not just like just

a thin normal string, it's a bit thick

because like, maybe, that thick-

STEVE: Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: And they tie it round, like in a circle,

hang it up on the-

STEVE: And where do they tie it to on the baby?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: So it's like on the leg so they put the

legs together, tie it on, and so there's

like one string around, and then one string

attached, and it's hanging upside down.

They get the knife but they don't just cut

it off absolutely, it's still on so it's

just like the head off but it's still

hanging on.

STEVE: Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes, and then there's a big white bowl on

the floor, and the blood drips in, and then

we put, we pour it in a big silver goblet.

STEVE: Okay, so where's this white bowl, where do

they get the white bowl from?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: They bought the big white bowl.

STEVE: From where?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: From the, there's a, any shop, any white-

STEVE: But where did they get the bowl from this

time?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Any shop, any shop like there's, so you

know-

STEVE: But you, obviously, didn't get see them get

the bowl?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: No, I don't know what shop but I think they

went to this, what is it called then, next

to Browncross?

STEVE:

Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

It's near Browncross.

STEVE:

And where is it kept at the church?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

In a cupboard, in a cupboard.

STEVE:

What cupboard?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: There's just like a normal cupboard so it's

like, you know like a cupboard, like a

kitchen cupboard.

STEVE:

Right, okay. And where is this kitchen

cupboard?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

So there's a kitchen in the church and in

the school.

STEVE:

Right-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes.

STEVE:

-there's a kitchen in-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes.

STEVE:

-I've got it-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes.

STEVE:

-there's a kitchen so in the kitchen-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes.

STEVE:

-the baby's hanging up-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes.

STEVE:

-and you said that-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

[Inaudible], yes.

[Crosstalk]

STEVE:

-there's a white bowl, and it's kept in a

cupboard.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes.

STEVE:

So what cupboard is it kept in?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

It's just a wooden cupboard so it's like-

STEVE: Okay. So if I was to go in the kitchen,

how would I find it? Tell me how I can

find this bowl?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: So it's like, it's not as this room, it's

much bigger, much bigger. So it's just

like maybe just around, just around on this wall, just around here there's this little cupboard. It's not little, it's kind of

medium size.

STEVE: Right, there's a medium cupboard so where's

the door in, so you've described the

kitchen-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes, the door is a bit like that, a bit

like that.

STEVE: So the door's over there, then you said the

cupboard would be in the other corner, have

I got that right?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes. Yes. Yes. Yes.

STEVE: Okay, and is the cupboard up in the top or

down in the bottom?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes. No, it's at the top. Like in the

middle like that, yes.

STEVE: And you say it's wooden. What colour

wooden?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Just normal brown wood.

STEVE: Okay, and are there any other cupboards

around it?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes, there is some other cupboards like

around the walls, you know like, so lots

and lots and lots, there's just a few.

STEVE: So if I come in, how can I go to that

cupboard without making any mistake with

one of the other cupboards?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: So, like, if you come in a room, here's the

sink, and here's the big table, and instead

this little, as I said, a cupboard.

STEVE: Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: So you see this frame [inaudible] it's like

a bit bigger than that size, and it's just

like a bit that colour of wood, a bit brown, and then it's just this cupboard, and it's just got the normal handles and

just, like, just wooden handles.

STEVE: Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: So then you have to open, and there's this

white bowl and the silver goblet, the two

things that we used, and the plates that we used to eat the baby on, yes, and they tell

me and Gabriel but who actually killed the

babies was my father. He kills the babies.

STEVE: Okay. So the baby's hanging up, and you

said, how do they hang it up, what do they

use? Got the string on the leg, and then

what's it attached to?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: No, no, no, it's got a screwdriver on the

wall.

STEVE: There's a screwdriver on the wall?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes, behind-

STEVE: Whereabouts on the wall?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: It's just like a wall, it's not like the

same like this room, the door is actually

there, and then that's the kitchen where we

actually do the, like the, that's the usual

kitchen where we like-

STEVE: So you go in, go through the door, so

where's this screw on the wall?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: So it's just like the door, pretend the

door is just there, there's another kitchen

there.

STEVE: Yeah.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: This is the kitchen area we usually use.

STEVE: Yeah, so how do I know that's a different

kitchen? What's different about this

kitchen? Where is it?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Well, because this is just, it's a

different shape, and it looks different.

STEVE: Whereabouts is this kitchen in this?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: In our school, in our school.

STEVE: Whereabouts in school?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: So it's just like the school just, it's a

normal kitchen school. The kitchen.

STEVE: The kitchen?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yeah, that's where they make the school

dinners.

STEVE: So, oh right, in the school canteen

kitchen?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes. Yes.

STEVE: Oh right so it's in there. So you go in

the door, where's the screw on the wall?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: So it's just like there, it's just, so

here's the door where you come in, and

there's this little screwdriver.

STEVE: Screwdriver? When you say, sorry,

screwdriver?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: It'

It's not a screwdriver, a screw.

STEVE:

Right. A screw?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes, it's in the wall, and a, but [you've got a?] space on so you have to hang the string on but you make sure it's still, it's like secure so they put, because they've got, because Mr Morris he works for hard, he works with hammers, he works with that kind of stuff, yeah, so he gets the screw in the wall, and after he hangs it up he hangs the baby up.

STEVE:

Right, okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

And then Papa and me-

STEVE:

Yeah.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

They hold, either me or Gabriel hold onto the knife but he actually kills the baby because he puts his hand on our hand so then he says to swing and then just chop off the baby's head off, then I stopped straight away, like, maybe, for maybe so, like, once so you'd go like this; one, and then just leave a bit of space so still on the head but it's better, it's just, the blood is dripping in the bowl though. That's how we drain out the blood.

STEVE:

Okay so you do that, blood's dripping.

Does blood not go like everywhere? Or not?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

No, no, no, no we don't make that, we've got I guess, like, we don't just go like smash like that, we go like this, one and

like not so speedy just like medium speed so you just go like that fast, like that, and we make sure there's not like blood spilt everywhere because then we make sure that everything is clean, as much as clean as they can do it because they clean it after that too.

STEVE: Okay, so they've cleaned up-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: So if the blood is on the floor or

something, they wipe it off.

STEVE: Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes.

STEVE: Okay. So the blood's in the bowl and then

what happens to the blood?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes, and then after we pour it in the

silver goblet, and-

STEVE: And where do they get this silver goblet

from?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: I don't know which shop.

STEVE: No, but like where in-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes, it's with the white bowl in the same

cupboard.

STEVE: In the same cupboard?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes.

STEVE: And it's a wooden cupboard, and that's not

in this kitchen with the hanging on the screws, it's in a different kitchen, is

that right?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes.

STEVE: Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Because they get the bowl from the other

kitchen to that kitchen.

STEVE: Got it, understood. So where are all the

people that work in the canteen then when

this was happening?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: I don't understand.

STEVE: Well there's obviously, if it's a kitchen

to make, I assume, is it to make all the children's lunches? Where are all those

people?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes, but instead of making those the

children lunches, they give baby to the

children.

STEVE: They give baby to the children?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes, so they give, like, if they say that's

spaghetti Bolognese that day, they put a

bit of baby meat in all the time.

STEVE: And how do they make baby meat to spaghetti

Bolognese? I don't understand?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Because they get, because they cut the

baby, Mrs Forsdyke, the Headmistress, she

cuts the baby.

STEVE: And what about all the bones and that?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes, yes, they keep the bones but then

after-

STEVE: Where do they go?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: No, no but the bones, they don't just like

keep them, they make stuff out of them so

they make like statues of the church-

STEVE: And where are these statues?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes, because they've got carving, like,

there's people, carving people, they work

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near Swiss Cottage, somewhere there that's where they work in a carving shop, and then they've got this, they've got the child there, there's a man called Felix there, and then he makes this like, he makes statues of churches, he makes that kind of

stuff. Yeah, so he makes-

STEVE: Sorry. Can you be quiet please, we're just

doing an interview. Cheers.

[UNKNOWN]: Yeah, we didn't know that.

STEVE: Yeah, no, fine cheers.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: So it's just they make like statues and

stuff out of the bones because they got

carving, as I said, they got carving people

so they got Felix, they got Max-

STEVE: Yeah.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Those are the two people who are the best

ones at carving so at the other church,

we've got our own church, yes, they make

carving of that church, and they don't just

sell it, they sell it sometimes, they keep it, the school keeps it sometimes but

usually they sell it for money because they

want money.

STEVE: And how do you know all this?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Because I saw they have statues of them.

STEVE: Okay, so Felix makes statues, and he-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes, and the skulls of the babies, you know

the skulls?

STEVE: Yeah.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes? They get the skulls, and they make a

hole with a driller, so they make a hole in, and they tie string around, and then they put it all around the body but they're naked, and they've got this tattoo on the private with a, like, little piercings.

STEVE:

Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

They're not like earrings but they're little gold piercings around their private, and they all dance around with skulls on, in the church though.

STEVE:

Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

So they put, they have skulls like, the teachers and the staff they've got 20 skulls each.

STEVE:

And how do you know they've got 20 each?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes, because I counted once, there was like, there's one here, and then there's one here, and then there's one on, like, here, like, it looks like skulls everywhere on their knees, on their elbows, it looks like armour.

STEVE:

Okay so if I was to try and find these skulls, where would I find them?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes, yes, in the church. In the church.

STEVE:

Where in the church?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

So there's these secret rooms, they've got

secret rooms.

STEVE:

Go on, tell me how do I find this secret

room?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes, yes, so when you go in this secret room because they hide it in loads of

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places, they hide it on-

STEVE: Would you be able to help me find it would

you?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes.

STEVE: Okav-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes, but they just hide them anywhere, they

just hide it in one place then they move to other place then they move another place,

there's just-

STEVE: Okay. So I go into the church now-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes, and they hide, usually, they hide it

in their houses.

STEVE: How do you know that?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Because they have parties in their houses.

STEVE: Okay. How do you know that?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Because Mr Hollings, my teacher. He lives

in Highgate.

STEVE: Right.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes. You can see in his house because his

Porsche, he got a Porsche, and has just had

a front door for his house.

STEVE: Yeah. Okay, so how do you know he keeps

them in his house?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Because I know because I went to his house

once.

STEVE: Tell me about his house, what does it look

like?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: It's big. It's big. It's big.

STEVE: Okay, big. We go in the front door, what

colour is the front door?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: It's just normal black colour, normal

black.

STEVE:

Normal black?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes, yes.

STEVE:

So we go, I go in, I've gone in to

Mr Peters' house was it, sorry?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

No, Mr Hollings.

STEVE:

Mr Hollings, sorry. I go into Mr Hollings'

house, through the black door so what do I

go into, what room?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes, yes, and there's just this corridor,

there's a corridor and,

STEVE:

Into a corridor? Tell me about the

corridor first of all.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

So there's a corridor, and it's just got

like, it's just like a little corridor, and

then there's a little table there, and the

shoes there, all his kind of shoes, yes.

STEVE:

Right. Stop there, sorry, I don't mean to,

that's rude of me to interrupt you, I'm

sorry.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes, that's okay.

STEVE:

So gone into this corridor, you said it's a

small corridor, there's a table with shoes.

So tell me about the table, tell me

everything about this table?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

This table it's got, it's not like, it does

not have stuff on, it doesn't have like skulls on, it doesn't have that. It got

just like maybe car keys, maybe it had got

his jacket on, maybe it had got his bag on,

I don't know, different kind of stuff,

personal stuff.

STEVE: Okay. So this table, what does it look

like?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: It's just like a normal, like a square

table.

STEVE: So it's square?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes.

STEVE: Because, obviously, there are, like in

here, like, someone could describe that as a table, this as a table, so they're all very different aren't they? So tell me about, first of all, if you stand up for me, stand up, can you stand up so how high

to you is the table?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Somewhere here.

STEVE: Okay so somewhere there. And then what

colour is it?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: It's just normal, like normal, just normal

like black colour like this, it's just

normal wooden black.

STEVE: Wooden black? So it's wooden black?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yeah, it's just normal. Yes.

STEVE: Okay, so it's a little bit higher than this

table, its wooden black, its square,

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes. Yes. Yes. So it's just like that

big, like that, that's [inaudible] like

this and like this.

STEVE: Okay, and then, right so that's the top of

it you described, and it's square.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes.

STEVE: And then when you go down a bit, what's

there?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes, there's under the table there's shoes

there, his shoes there so like all his different kind of shoes, his shoes, yes.

STEVE: Okay. So under the table he keeps his

shoes?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes.

STEVE: Okay, and then what about the floor?

What's on the floor?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: On the floor it's just, as I said, it's

just got shoes on, and it got a little

carpet.

STEVE: Okay but what's the floor? Sorry?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: It got carpet on the floor too.

STEVE: Carpet. What sort of carpet?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Well, it's not like a carpet like, it's not

like a carpet everywhere, everywhere, it's the type, like, you know when you come in the house and there's usually the small, like a small cupboard, a carpet at the

front of the door, yeah, they got that, and

then the rest is just wooden.

STEVE: What sort of wood?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Wooden just, brown, just, you see this

colour door, just like that.

STEVE: So that shows quite a dark brown? Can you

just point the camera to that door for a sec? So that sort of colour brown? So

that's colour brown for his floor?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes.

STEVE: So you go down the corridor-

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A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes.

STEVE: And then what rooms are off the corridor?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: So there was this corridor, here's the

living room, here's the kitchen, and then just there there's this toilet, and then here's you go up the room, up the stairs

here's you go up the room, up the stairs.

STEVE: Okay, so, right, so go in, there's a

living room?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes.

STEVE: A kitchen?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes.

STEVE: A downstairs toilet?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes.

STEVE: And some stairs that go upstairs?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes, yes.

STEVE: And have you been in all of those rooms

downstairs?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes.

STEVE: Okay. Tell me about the living room first

of all. What's in the living room?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: The living room, they've got secret rooms

in there.

STEVE: What does that mean?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: They've got secret rooms in there.

STEVE: In the living room?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes.

STEVE: Okay. Well, tell me about-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: They are top secret, top secret.

STEVE: Okay, if we talk about the not top secret

bits first of all, tell me about the normal

bits of the living room?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yeah, so there's just like, it's bigger

than this.

STEVE: Okay, so it's a room bigger than this.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yeah, it's a big large room, and then

they've got a table, they've got a

television, they've got a sofa, it's like a

normal living room.

STEVE: Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes, and it's like a half part is a living

room, and a half part is a dining room.

STEVE: Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: So it's like mixed rooms, that's why it's

big.

STEVE: Okay. So it's got a living room and a

dining room, yeah?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes. Yes.

STEVE: And-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: In one whole room.

STEVE: And has he got any tables or chairs or

sofas or anything like that?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes. Yes, yes.

STEVE: What's he got?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: So he got a television, a big Samsung.

STEVE: Samsung? How do you know its Samsung?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Because you can see the silver writing,

Samsung on.

STEVE: Okay. So he's got a Samsung telly, a big

one?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yeah.

STEVE: And where is that telly?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: It's just like at the front, like, it looks

a bit like a table like that but it's a bit smaller. It's a bit like this size, this,

like, this height.

STEVE: Okay, and how big is that thing?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: It's the same size but it's just this

height.

STEVE: So it's as big as this but smaller so about

this height at least?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes.

STEVE: But, okay,

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: And then the television is there, and the

sofa is there, there's a table,

STEVE: Tell me about the sofa. What sort of sofa

has he got?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: So it's like a, it's not like a sofa, it's

not like multi-coloured.

STEVE: It's not multi-coloured?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: It's just like, not brown, but it's kind of

blackish, really really dark brown.

STEVE: And what sort of size is the sofa?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: It's like this but, like, if you join that

chair to the sofa so if it's like that and

you add a chair just here then it's a

joined-

STEVE: So it's longer is it?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes, yes.

STEVE: And what about, and then, okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: So it's a long sofa like that, there like

this-

STEVE: And what shape is it, the sofa?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: So it's like this so you go, it's like

that, the sofa, like that.

STEVE:

Okay, like an L-shape you're showing me?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes, like that.

STEVE:

Okay. So he's got a bigger sofa than this,

it's like a blacky colour, it's in an L-

shape?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes, really really dark brown. Like much

darker.

STEVE:

Okay. And where does he keep the baby

skulls?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

The baby skulls in his house, yes.

STEVE:

Whereabouts?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

So then at the front, in the dining room  $% \left( \frac{1}{2}\right) =\frac{1}{2}\left( \frac{1}{2}\right)$ 

there's this big wardrobe, and he just

keeps maybe spare clothes or anything like

that, like, maybe, like if there's like,

maybe, plates, bowls, anything like that,

he just keeps it there but it's not like the wardrobe is just like the skulls right

in the wardrobe, you can see it, like, you

open the door and you can see it.

STEVE:

Yeah.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

It's not like that. It's top secret in

there.

STEVE:

No? Go on then, tell me how to find it

then?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes, so then after, he just maybe there's because sometimes he keeps spare clothes,

as I said, so you've got the hanger, and

you've got just clothes, the coats or

anything like that there, and after you

have to part the clothes, and there's a little door there but it's like, it's like, it looks camouflaged, you can't really see it.

STEVE:

How do you mean? So how would I be able to

find it? The door?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

So if, so here's the clothes but you can't see the door because the clothes are at the

front of it.

STEVE:

Yeah.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

It's all like all covered like that.

STEVE:

Yeah.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

But you have to part the clothes, and then after, it's like, it looks like a just like a normal wall but it's not a normal wall,

it's got a little handle there.

STEVE:

Is there?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes.

STEVE:

And what does this handle look like? How

could I find it?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

It's like, like, not a normal handle like

that but it's still wooden it's like a

bendy one like, how do you say? Like that.

STEVE:

Okay. And when I open that door, what do I

find?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

So then inside is, you have to go

downstairs, underground.

STEVE:

It goes underground?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes. Yes.

STEVE:

And what's in there underground?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

So then we go underground, and after

there's this little hallway, and on the right there's this door, and then there's

the big enormous secret room.

STEVE: And what's in the secret room?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: In the secret room there's cupboards

everywhere, looks like everywhere, then

they do sex there too.

STEVE: How do you know they do sex there?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Because they took me there to do sex?

STEVE: Who took you there?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: My father, Mr Hollings took me.

STEVE: So your, who?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: My father.

STEVE: Your father, sorry. Okay, do you call him

father or Papa?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Papa.

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STEVE: Is it Papa? So Papa's taking you down

there, and what did you do there?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: So it's just like, say after, you do sex

there so they have,

STEVE: What does sex mean?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: So they have plastic with their body part,

plastic willies.

STEVE: Right, okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes, and then they strap it on but they

make sure, they want plastic willies, they

don't want to use their real willies.

STEVE: Why not?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Because it just, doesn't hurt, they want to

make sure it hurts.

STEVE: Okay, so who's they? So Papa and who else?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Mr Hollings, Headmistress, all the

teachers.

STEVE: Okay so Papa and Mr Hollings, the

Headmistress-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes. Miss Marden, Mr Fennoni[?], Mr Gorge.

STEVE: Okay, so who done it when you went to that

house, who was there?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: So all the staff.

STEVE: All the staff.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: All the parents, you know the parents of

all the children, they all know about it.

They do it.

STEVE: Okay. Okay. And so you've gone in there,

and who's used the plastic willies?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: All of them. All of them.

STEVE: All of them. And where do they keep the

plastic willies?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: They keep them in the cupboards. As I

said, they've got cupboards around.

STEVE: Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: So they've got like, maybe, two cupboards

there, and two cupboards there, they've got

cupboards around. All around the room.

STEVE: Okay. So I want to just make sure I get

his absolutely correct. So if I went to

Mr-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: And they've got exits so if in case of,

because in case because they know that,

they know that because they do not trust me

and Gabriel.

STEVE: Yeah.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: That, because they say that not to tell

anyone about this.

STEVE: Yes, okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: But they do not trust us.

STEVE: No, why not?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Maybe because they can see them because

they, because they, when they tell us not to tell about this or anything, they look so curious, so it looks like they not, they

don't trust us.

STEVE: Okay. So I'll just get this right.

Mr Hollings' house, I'll go there, he has a Porsche outside then you go to the door, dark door, you go into a corridor, it's got a little carpet by the door, wooden floor

very dark like this door, yeah?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes. Yes, yes.

STEVE: On the sides of the, you've shown me there,

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes there's the living room, at the front

there's a kitchen, and then there's the,

STEVE: There's a little table, then you go into

the living room, you've got a large sofa, which is in an L-shape, big Samsung telly

which is on a large black shelf thing you

described. You said in the dining room

area, he's got a wardrobe, then-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes, and it's all just stuffed in spare

clothes, as I said,

STEVE: All stuffed with spare clothes but if you

part it, you can find a little door which

goes down into a cellar-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes, but you can't really see it because

it's, like, kind of, camouflaged.

STEVE: It's camouflaged?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes, it looks a bit camouflaged.

STEVE: But there's a little wooden handle?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes, yes.

STEVE: You can open that-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes.

STEVE: Go down-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: But they've got exits, thing is that

they've got exits there because they can

run out the house too.

STEVE: Right, okay. But you go down into this, it

takes you down into a basement, and then in

there, there's loads of cupboards-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: There's loads of cupboards, and a settee-

STEVE: And in there, your dad, so Papa,

Mr Hollings, some other members of staff

then had sex with you using plastic

willies-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes, and then they touched each other,

STEVE: Which they, okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: And, as I said, they sell me and my brother

for £50 each every single day.

STEVE: To who?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: To any people, any people who like, like

any people who would, like, do, well, who

are like, the kind of people who would

actually do sex to, like, who can't come to

school if they are busy or anything like

that but then they keep me and Gabriel to

do sex to us, they've got their equipment, so they've got their plastic willies, and then they do it, and then after, and then, maybe, for two hours, maybe, during school

hours.

Okay so the, what is sex? We haven't said

what sex is, what is it?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: So, like, sex so they touch each other on

the privates and, as I said, they, well, I didn't tell you about this but they've got

this big plastic stick-

STEVE: Right.

STEVE:

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Not plastic but wooden. Yes, and then they

put it between our legs, and they hit it right between us but like in between our

legs.

STEVE: So they hit you with a wooden stick between

your legs?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes. Yes.

STEVE: And what's that, is that sex is it?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: No, no, no but that's how they hurt us,

STEVE: What's sex then?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: -but real sex is, like, they get plastic

willies, they stick it in our bum, that's

what kind of sex they do.

STEVE: And what is your bum?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: So they stick it in, the plastic willy, in

our bum so where the poo comes out.

STEVE: Okay, so they put a plastic willy in the

bum where the poo comes out?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes. Yes.

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STEVE: Okav, ar

Okay, and anywhere else?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes, in our front private.

STEVE:

Oh okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

And then they some-

STEVE:

You say our front private, who are you

talking about?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes, no, no, say if they, like, if, because

if we say it hurts or if we cry or make a

sound, they'll give us spoon licks so

they'll get a spoon-

STEVE:

Spoon licks, what does that mean?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes. So they'll get a spoon, and they hit

us, hit us, hit us on the head. That's why whenever we come back to our mum she always

says, she doesn't say but that's why we've

always got bumps on our heads.

STEVE:

Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

But she doesn't say, 'Why do you have bumps

on your head?' She doesn't say that.

STEVE:

Do you know how to get to Mr Hollings

house, do you?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

You mean from, like, our school?

STEVE:

From your school, do you?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

A bit, I know some of the way, I know some

of the way.

STEVE:

Where, if we took you some, where would you

be able to find where his house is? At one

point-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

So it's just, I don't remember, there's

like the number of his actual house.

STEVE:

But could you, say we drove near it, could

you say, 'Yeah, it's that one'? Could you do that?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes, I can spot it because I know because

he always park, well, he, no matter what he

always parks his Porsche at the front.

STEVE: Okay.

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A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Always. I know all like his car looks

like, I know absolutely-

STEVE: Do you know what street it's in? What the

name of the street is or whereabouts?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: No, I don't remember but I know its

Highgate. It's Highgate.

STEVE: So, if we went to Highgate, would you be

able to find the house?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes, if we drove around Highgate, drove

around, and if I spot like a bloke, if I

spot the house because I know how the house

looks like.

STEVE: But, obviously, there's, say like there's,

maybe, a thousand houses in Highgate,

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes, yes, yes a lot.

STEVE: How would you know where to go? How would

you know, could you say, 'Oh turn left down

this street', or how would you know?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: No, but that's because when me and Abraham,

my mums friend, and my mum and Gabriel, we got to our friends house called Gary, yes,

and then we go through Highgate, he lives

near Highgate so when you go through

Highgate, just at the bottom of Highgate,

he lives there, so when you go through, on

the left, that's the road where I remember, that's around there, that's where his house

his.

STEVE: So, if we went to Gary's house, you'd be

able to tell me from there would you?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yeah.

STEVE: Perfect.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: And my mum and Abraham knows how to go to

Gary's house so when, on the way I know,

yes.

STEVE: Okay, and has anything ever happened at

your dad's house?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes.

STEVE: What?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: My father lives at Angel Road.

STEVE: Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: But it's like on the corner, right on the

corner.

STEVE: Okay, and what happened there?

And so they got the same, like Mr Hollings. A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

STEVE: What, same what?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: A bit the same house, a bit the same, the

same, well, like I said, the wardrobe,

there's that kind of stuff, it's the same

so they've got this little, the stairs

downstairs, yes, because, yes.

Okay, so if I went to your dad's house, get STEVE:

to your dads house, what kind of door's

his?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yeah, his one is kind of light-ish brown,

light-ish brown.

STEVE: So he's got a lightish brown door so go in

there, where's this wardrobe?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: In the living room, as I said, a bit like

Mr Hollings'.

STEVE: So go to the living room, and what does

this wardrobe look like?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: It's not like Mr Hollings' but similar, its

long, its long.

STEVE: Okay so go to the wardrobe, and how do I

get through the secret door? How do I get

into the secret door?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yeah, they got a keys, they've got keys to

the door because Mr Morris, my father,

well, Papa-

STEVE: How can I tell there's a door there, so I

go to the wardrobe, how would I know that it's not just the back of a wardrobe and

it's a door, how can I tell? What's

different about it?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Well, there's no difference, there's no

difference.

STEVE: Where do you put the key then? I don't

understand.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: No, no, no there's no key to go in the

wardrobe, there's no key-

STEVE: Right, sorry, I misunderstood this.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: But when you go down the stairs into the

secret room, underground, they've got the

room, the room in the, there, they've got

the keys to it.

STEVE: Oh okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Mr Morris, Papa, Mrs Forsdyke, Mr Hollings,

they've got the big, big bunches of keys.

Big.

STEVE: I see. So how do I get, so I open the

wardrobe, what's in the wardrobe?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: So it's just stuffed in with clothes, like

spare clothes, yes.

STEVE: It's stuffed in with clothes, so I get all

the clothes out of the way, then what do I

find?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: And then after you find there's just, it

looks just like a normal wardrobe wall

because it's camouflaged and they make sure

you can't see it but actually there is a

door.

STEVE: Yes, so how do I find the door?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Because it's right in the middle so here's

like the, this is the wardrobe-

STEVE: Would I be able to see, like, the gap or

not?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: No, it's like camouflaged so like imagine

this was like red, and then, like, imagine

this was, like, this is the same colour,

STEVE: Would I be able to move the wardrobe out

the way, and find a hole in wall? Would I

or not?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: No, no, no, there's no, no because you have

to, the door is attached to the wall, and

it's got stairs going down.

STEVE: Right, so if I move the wardrobe, would I

see the door?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes, but then if some-

STEVE: Okay, so is that the best thing to do then

is it, to move the wardrobe?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes, sometimes, yes, but sometimes when

they go in the wardrobe, and they go

downstairs, they close behind the door, and

then they got this, another brick, it looks

like another brick wall, it looks like a

brick wall door, and then they close it

behind too.

STEVE: Right, so-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: It looks like a double door.

STEVE: Let me just make sure I'm clear, so go into

your dad's house, wardrobe's there, I move

the wardrobe out of the way, there's a

door, I go down the stairs, and then what

do I see down the stairs?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Down the stairs you go down, and then, as I

said, you've got a little corridor, a

little hallway.

STEVE: Yeah.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: So then there's the little hallway, and

then on the right just here then there's just a little, another, just a tiny tiny corridor so, maybe, like from there, from here to here, and then there's this door just here, and then that's where the secret

speak to children.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Because they're, they're involved.

STEVE: Go on, what do you mean?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Like, instead of, like, that they know what

everything is, their parents don't know everything maybe to children didn't say maybe something. Maybe there's one thing

that children didn't say to the parent.

STEVE: Yes, that's sometimes why. And sometimes

we talk, the reason we talk on our own is

sometimes, because, say, you're embarrassed

or scared to tell your mum, then-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: About one thing.

STEVE: Yes, so if she was here and you think, oh I

don't want my mum to know or I'm scared for

her to know, she won't know because she won't be here will she? So then we can

Here's the pegs where, the cloakroom.

STEVE: Yes, yes.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: And after this it's just, like, this big

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: -and then there's a little door going in to

the toy room.

STEVE: Oh okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: So where all the toys are kept-

STEVE: Oh okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: -for the children to play with.

STEVE: And what's in the toys room?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes, so it's just, like, there's just toys

around. But then after there's, they got,

they keep cupboards. But then our

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Headmistress she tells the nursery, whoops,

so that, to the nursery that those

cupboards, that if they can keep them, but, like, not look into them or, like, use them

or anything.

STEVE: And they're in the toy room?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes.

STEVE: Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: And then after-

STEVE: What's in those cupboards?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: In those cupboards they got the, like, the

big white, white bowl where they put, where

the blood drips in.

STEVE: Okay, okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes, and then they got the kni-, you know,

cleaver, there's this big Chinese one-

Yes, they keep it like a nursery kitchen,

but they don't use it.

STEVE:

So, through that door there's a nursery,

there's a kit-, there's a room-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes, it's, like-

STEVE:

-[inaudible] nursery-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes.

Yes.

STEVE:

-and a kitchen?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

STEVE:

But they don't use it?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes, it's a door just, like, just, this is,

like, how big it is, it seemed, like, that

big. And then there's just here, there's

this little door and then you, not little,

it's a door, a normal sized door, and when

you go in it's just a big kitchen and-

STEVE:

Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

-then they've got just a big silver fridge.

STEVE:

Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

They keep, like, leftover of the baby meat

there.

STEVE:

Oh okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes, and they, and they keep the white

bowl. Sometimes if there's any blood left

over-

STEVE:

Right.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

-so, because some, my dad, whenever he,

He's not, he, like, my dad, he eats maybe,

like, sometimes he eats two times a day,

like, baby, two times a day.

STEVE:

Baby two, okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes, sometimes like that, if he feels like

eating more baby.

STEVE:

Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Because we have one big piece-

STEVE:

So-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

-that big piece of baby every day.

STEVE:

Right, okay. So, let me just get this

straight. So, you go into the church?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes.

STEVE:

Then you described there's some stairs,

carpet area with the table?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes.

STEVE:

Then there's, then-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Here's the carpet area, so all around there

but it's like much bigger space all around

here.

Yes.

STEVE:

Okay. Then there's one room, this is a

nursery with a kitchen on it?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

STEVE:

Which you can, do you get into it from this

room, do you?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes, yes.

STEVE:

Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

It's just here where the seats are, and

then there's the big thing-

STEVE:

Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

-the big carpet.

STEVE:

Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Just next to that, it's just there.

STEVE: Okay. So then there's that room, and you

say you don't really use that room?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: No, they don't use that really.

STEVE: For anything?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: No.

STEVE: No?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: They raise, they just, they just use it

really, like, if the chil-, if the nursery

child, if the child-

STEVE: Yes.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: -doesn't, didn't bring the packed lunch in.

STEVE: Oh okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: The would sometimes say I'll have, like,

food, that which they give, like porridge

or something like that.

STEVE: Okay, okay. So, in the other room-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes.

STEVE: -is nursery, which they use?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes.

STEVE: And then you go into a toy room?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes, it's just, like-

STEVE: And there's some cupboards where they keep

a bowl and a cleaver?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes.

STEVE: Are there any other doors or anything in

this toy room?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: No, but there's another room when you go in

church, so, like, I'll draw, can I use the

other paper to draw, like, where?

STEVE: You use what you wish.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Because this, so when you go in the church

it's, like, here's, you're outside-

STEVE:

Yes.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

-and then there's this little gate-

STEVE:

Yes.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: -and this little passageway just here. And

then that's ano-, the entrance to the

church.

STEVE:

Yes.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes, so then you go straight and to the

stair, then that, and then the stairs just

here-

STEVE:

Yes.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

-going up. And after you go that way, and

after there's, there's, like, maybe, like,

two stairs there. And then after there's

this other door-

STEVE:

Right.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

-just here.

STEVE:

Right, and what's in there.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

And then after there's the hallway going

into the church, all around the church,

it's just there. So this is, like, this

is, like, where the whole church part is.

And then there's this other room here-

STEVE:

Yes.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

-all, like, this is, like, the entrance.

STEVE:

Right.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Then after there's this other room where

the priest, there's, he, he somet-, he's,

he's, like, he's, like, his things are in

there.

STEVE:

Right.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes, but then after where the big carpet

is-

STEVE:

And how do you know that?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Because we go there, we do sex there.

STEVE:

Right, oh okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes, so then where this big carpet space,

there's another door leading into there

too.

STEVE:

Right, okay. So you're outside here are

you?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes.

Yes.

STEVE:

So you're outside-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

STEVE:

-you know where the cars park, like, behind

each other-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes, yes.

STEVE:

-where's that, is that this side or is that

somewhere else?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

No, it's this side.

STEVE:

So, it's the other side of the church?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes.

STEVE:

This is the side by the road is it?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes.

STEVE:

Right, okay, so this is the side by the

road. So you go along and there's a door?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes, so this is like-

STEVE:

Is this a door?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

-a gate outside, a gate outside here.

STEVE:

Okay, so-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: And it's still outside, this part.

this door goes inside the church.

STEVE:

Right.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

But then it goes, gets a little path, as I

said-

STEVE:

Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

-then you, there's this path which goes to,

then you have to go straight-

STEVE:

Yes.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

-to the right. And then after, when you go

to the right, just at the front of you-

STEVE:

Yes.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

-there's this, like, maybe, as I said,

maybe, like, four stairs, four small steps

up.

STEVE:

Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

And then after you have, and then after,

when, like, you're up here, and then after

you go straight, like, so, like, when you

go on the stairs here-

STEVE:

Yes.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

-so up, yes, up here, like, this is the

way. And after you have to, so, it's just,

like, I don't know, so, so you're up the

stairs on this part here.

STEVE:

Right, okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes, and then after, so you're here and

then just there there's this door going

inside the church. And then after there's

this passageway, as I said, as I said

you've got this little passageway. So,

here, the passageway is all, all along

here, and then after, but then, on the side, just here, there's this door.

STEVE: Yes.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: That's, like, how, that's, like, how it is

in the church.

STEVE: Right, okay. So this gate is at the side

of the church-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: That's-

STEVE: -not on the side where the cars are parked?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: No, no.

STEVE: The other side?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: On the other side, on the other side.

STEVE: You go through the gate, which is outside-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: But the school's just here, the school is

just here, it's just a little, like a

little path.

STEVE: Yes.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: That's, the church is just right-

STEVE: So is it on that side where there's a

little path? Is this on the-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes.

STEVE: This is on the path side?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes.

STEVE: Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: So here's, this is, like, the up bit and

this is the down bit. So here's-

STEVE: Okay. So the path is here between the

church and school, yes?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: No, yes, the pr-, like, no, no, so here's

the entrance to the church, but, like,

pretend this is the path.

STEVE:

So the path is here?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes, all along here.

STEVE:

Okay, so the path's along here, then you go

through the gate-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes.

STEVE:

-then into-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: The church, so you've got the keys and

you've got a big door.

STEVE:

-the church. Through some stairs and that,

and then there's a room where-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes, yes.

STEVE:

-the priest uses-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Where you do sex, yes.

STEVE:

-that?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: And there's this, this table here-

STEVE:

Yes.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

-but a small, small table they've got.

STEVE:

Yes.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

And then they've got, like, little pegs-

STEVE:

Yes.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

-for the things that priest got.

STEVE:

Yes.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

And then they've got cupboards along there,

and then they've got the secret things.

They've got, like, like a big, like a lock.

Because Mr Morris, the caretaker-

STEVE:

Yes.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

-and my father and Mr Hollings and the

priest-

STEVE:

Yes.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

-and Mrs Forsdyke, they're all share, they

got, like, big, so, it's like a big,

they've got this big cir-, metal ring. And

then they've got loads of keys on, loads,

all, like-

STEVE: Where do they keep these keys?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: In their pockets because Mr Morris, he got

enormous pockets.

STEVE: Has he?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes, he got enormous jea-, he got big jeans

and he got, like, he wears jeans. He's a tall, big guy, he looks strong. And he got, like, like, he's like pockets, like,

size of this.

STEVE: Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: They're to your knee. And he kept, he

keeps it there. Like, he like, like, he's

the caretaker-

STEVE: Yes.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: -so he closes, he closes the school, he got

the keys to the rooms in the school, like-

STEVE: Right.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: -like, all like that. He got the keys to

the church, all the, all the property they

got-

STEVE: Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: -so, like, everything they own. So, they

own a school, they own a church, because

it's our church.

STEVE: Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes, they keep the church.

STEVE: Right. So, these secret things they're

kept in the room where the priest keeps his

things, is that right?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes, yes, because the priest-

STEVE: And whereabouts in his room do they keep

these secret things?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Just, like, right at the back. And it's,

just, it looks like, it's just, like,

here's the door-

STEVE: Yes.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: -and it's far back, it's just they don't

have enough space. Then it's just, like-

STEVE: Yes, okay. And what does it look like,

this thing, they keep the secret things in?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: It just looks like, really, like,

patterned, patterned, like, imagine this, it's not as big as this room. It's, like,

imagine there's this big, like, big

cupboard here-

STEVE: Yes.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: -and it's just, like, it looks like a

wardrobe. They've got loads of, like,

wooden patterns on.

STEVE: And what is kept in there?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes, they keep, they got a big key lock

there.

STEVE: Yes.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: So then they unlock the lock with the key.

STEVE: Yes.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: The lock.

STEVE: Yes.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: And open up the wardrobe, and after, as I

said, so special things they got. So, because the priest, the priest, he got a car anyway.

STEVE:

Right.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

So, like-

STEVE:

So what secret things they keep in there?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes, so he keeps, like, precious things,

like, maybe car keys, maybe, like-

STEVE:

Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

And then he some, they keep the skulls

there. Because they wear like 20, the

adults-

STEVE:

Okay, so some skulls kept there.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

-the parents, they all, because the

parents, the parents of the children they keep their own skulls in their own house,

because they dance in their own house.

STEVE:

Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes, but then, so, like, Vanessa, she's a

parent, she keeps her own skulls.

STEVE:

Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

But, like, the teachers and my father's, my

father's skulls are kept in the, because

they wear 20, they wear 20 skulls each.

And there's 20 special children-

STEVE:

Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

-so, Milly and the others.

STEVE:

Yes, okay. So, just want to make sure I've

got the description of this whole church

right.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes.

Just tell me if I'm wrong, okay, just stop-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes.

STEVE:

-if I get something wrong, stop me.

You've got the main entrance-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes.

STEVE:

-you go in, and in that big room there's-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes.

STEVE:

-rows of chairs.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes.

STEVE:

Then there's a pathway in the middle

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes.

STEVE:

-where you can walk up and down.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes.

STEVE:

Then there's a larger area up some stairs

which is carpeted-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes.

STEVE:

-it's got a table on.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes.

STEVE:

And that's where they do the dancing-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes.

STEVE:

-with the skulls.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes. Yes, right about, yes.

STEVE:

Then there's two nurseries; one's not used

very much-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes.

STEVE:

-and it's got a kitchen with a silver

fridge.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes.

STEVE:

And sometimes they make porridge for the

children there.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes, but they do-

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They keep-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

But they keep the porridge into, like,

cupboards where all the food, like honey or

whatever they use for the porridge.

STEVE:

Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Or maybe like jam they put, because they

sometimes make toast for the children.

They don't, like, they don't use the fridge

really; it's just porridge, it's just,

like-

STEVE:

Okay. And then they keep bits of baby-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes.

STEVE:

-leftover baby and leftover blood.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes, yes, but they don't, like, the

Headmistress, they make sure, like, do not let the nursery use, like, they've used the

fridge.

STEVE:

They're not allowed to use the fridge in

the nursery?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes, yes, they're not allowed.

STEVE:

And how can they not get in the fridge?

Why can't the nursery just open it?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Because one is that [inaudible]

Headmistress-

STEVE:

Yes.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

-she's still the head, head of the church.

STEVE:

Yes, but say, like-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

She's the head of the nursery.

STEVE:

-say, like, one of the nursery's thought,

brought a yoghurt in because they were hungry for lunch, and they thought, oh

actually, I'll just put it in the fridge.

Why couldn't they just put it in the

fridge?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: No, they're, they're not allowed, not

allowed.

STEVE: But say there was-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: But in the room, like, the staff room of

the nursery-

STEVE: Yes.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: -so the nursery room, yes, at the back

there's this door and it's the exit of the

nursery.

STEVE: Yes.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: To the other side, and then there's just a

toilet for the nursery. And instead

there's this room where the nur-, like, the

people who work in the nursery, that's

where they all rest. They've got their own

fridge there.

STEVE: Oh okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: To keep things-

STEVE: So there's a little room off the nursery?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes, they already got their own fridge.

STEVE: So you go into the nursery-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes.

STEVE: -you said there's a little tiny room off it

that's for where they can rest?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes, like an office of the nursery.

STEVE: There's an office in the nursery where they

can rest?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes.

And also there's a toy room?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes-

STEVE:

Yes.

Yes.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

-a toy room, like, right at the back of

the, like, there.

STEVE:

Okay, you go in the toy room then there's a

cupboard.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

STEVE:

Are there any other doors in this room?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

No, there's no doors really, it's just,

like, just cupboards are there. And all on

the sides is just packet of toys

everywhere.

STEVE:

So you definitely can't get in-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes.

STEVE:

If you go into that-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes.

STEVE:

-you can only go back into the nursery, you

can't go anywhere else?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes, it's just, it's just, like, just

cupboards there and then it's just got toys

everywhere around you.

STEVE:

So you definitely-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes.

STEVE:

-can't go anywhere else other than the

nursery?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes, but they got this little-

STEVE:

Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

-big box with, like, broken toys and-

STEVE:

Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

But they don't keep, like, they don't,

like, they make sure, like, because they make sure that they-

STEVE:

Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

-can't, they make sure, like, the
Headmistress, she's still the head of the

nursery.

STEVE:

Yes.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Because the nursery, they are like the part

of the church.

STEVE:

Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Headmistress do not let, they're like,

she's the head of the nursery anyway.

STEVE:

Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

So she, she does not let the nursery, the nursery teachers, well, nursery staff, they

do not let, she gives them, like, thing,

like, rules, like do not go in the

cupboards, do not go to the fridge or

anything.

But then, but because they, because

Mrs Forsdyke, she doesn't really trust the

nursery, she got her own locks on the

cupboards anyway-

STEVE:

Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

-because she does not really trust them.

STEVE:

Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Just in case, like, just in case they do,

they, like, they do go, like, come in and,

like, just, like, open the cupboard.

STEVE:

Okay, all right. That's very good, thank

you. Thanks, that was a very good

description you've given me there, thank

you.

So, did you want to sit, are you

comfortable there or would you rather sit

back on the sofa?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: I don't mind.

STEVE: You sit where, you sit wherever you're

comfortable, it's up to you.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Those speakers still can hear.

STEVE: Yes, what is if he can't hear, if Karl

can't hear us he would have come and

knocked on that door to say. And then-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Oh.

STEVE: -when I hear a knock on that door I know

Karl wants me to speak up or-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Speak a bit louder.

STEVE: Yes.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: All right.

STEVE: So, rather than interrupt us.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes, yes.

STEVE: Okay? Okay, so we've spoken about the

church. Do you mind if I just quickly

check the time, okay, it's just ...

There's, what I'll do, I'll ask a quick

couple of questions then you can have a

little break, is that all right?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes.

STEVE: Okay. So who is it you live with at home

at the moment?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: My mum, my mum and Abraham.

STEVE: Your mum, Abraham, anyone else?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: No. But my Nan, Galia, she comes.

STEVE: Galia?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes.

STEVE: And that's short for something, isn't it,

Galia?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: No, her real name is Galina.

STEVE: Galina, yes, and Galia's short isn't it?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes, because she's Russian and Ukrainish.

STEVE: Yes, yes. Then your mum and Abraham?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes, they're, we live with them.

STEVE: And what do you call Abraham, do you always

call him Abraham or do you call him

anything else?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: No, we don't call him Abraham we call him

Papa Hemp.

STEVE: Papa Hemp. So Papa Hemp, Mama-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes.

STEVE: -and Galia.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes.

STEVE: Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Galia does not live with us.

STEVE: No? Where does she live?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: No, she lives, I don't know where she

lives, she never took us to her house.

STEVE: Yes.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: But, but she, I don't know where she lives

but she comes to our house to work, to look

after us when my, when Papa Hemp and mum

are, like, out tonight-

STEVE: Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: -or anything like that.

STEVE: Okay. So tell me about, tell me about Mama

first of all, what's she like?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: She's kind; we ask her for food mostly.

STEVE: Yes.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: But, but we sometimes nag her for food

though.

STEVE: Yes.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: But we don't always, but Abraham, but-

STEVE: Why's that, why do you mag for food?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Because we love eating but sometimes she

says, like, maybe she get, makes us a soup

or something. But we don't really want

soup; we like sweet stuff.

STEVE: Yes.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: So that's why we ask her for fruit, like,

bananas, because we've got, like, loads of

baskets of bananas in our house.

STEVE: Yes. What's your favourite soup?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Well, they don't make that kind of soup,

like chicken soup or anything like that.

STEVE: No, no, what do you make?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: They make, like, you know hemp?

STEVE: I know hemp, it's like a root of a plant.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes, you know weed which you smoke?

STEVE: Yes.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes, but, it's real name is hemp.

STEVE: Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: But, like, fresh hemp, yes, that's what we

make, like, soup out. We have a juicer and

we make, we juice the soup.

STEVE: Right, so you-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: We don't have, like, pieces in or anything

like that.

STEVE: So you don't have, like, vegetable-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Not, no, we don't have, like, normal soup

like that.

STEVE: Or mushroom soup?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: No, hmm hmm. We used to but now we don't.

But when we used to go to school they used

to give us, like, red rice, wild red rice.

STEVE: Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: They used to give us that and buckwheat and

that kind of stuff.

STEVE: Okay. I've got a question: how do you

about weed, how did you know that you smoke

weed?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Abraham, Abraham told me about that.

STEVE: What did he tell you about that then?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: He said that, like, weed, you're not

supposed to, like, the first time we met

him-

STEVE: Yes.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: -so he told my mum about hemp.

STEVE: What did he say?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: And he said that 'You don't smoke weed',

even though my mum did not smoke it, but she didn't know what weed was anyway. So

he told her that you have to eat it fresh,

not dry or anything.

STEVE: Right.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: So then, all that kind of stuff. So, like,

so, because he a nutritionist he says.

Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

So he, because we[?] used to eat it.

STEVE:

So where do you buy that from then?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Oh, we, I don't know but they, we went to

holiday to Morocco-

STEVE:

Yes.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

-for holiday but-

STEVE:

No, I mean to get soup, where do you buy

the hemp to make soup?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes, they got that, it's delivered to us.

STEVE:

Oh right, okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes, but then most of it is bad.

STEVE:

Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

And we got loads of buckets of hemp seeds,

like, whole hemp seeds.

STEVE:

Yes.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Not like, not the ones in shops in those

little plastic bags with, like, who are,

like soft ones.

STEVE:

Okay, so why do you need the seeds?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

To juice them.

STEVE:

You juice the seeds?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Because, because we get the milk from it,

we make juices.

STEVE:

Oh I see, I see, I understand.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

We make green juices, that kind of stuff.

STEVE:

I understand.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Well, my mum used to make us, like, like

soup which is the, it got cabbage, but like

red, it's like-

STEVE:

[Make a borscht?].

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes, it's like, it's like it got, like,

beetroot pieces-

STEVE: Yes.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: -but it's, like, boiled.

STEVE: Yes.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: It's not fresh.

STEVE: No, I know, yes.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: But it's like, it's like red cabbage,

you've got a bit of red cabbage.

STEVE: Yes.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Because she, we used to buy the veggie

sausages.

STEVE: Yes.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: So, like, they're made out of soya.

STEVE: Yes.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Not like real pork ones.

STEVE: Okay. So Mama's nice-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes.

STEVE: -but sometimes you mag her for food.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes.

STEVE: What's your favourite thing about Mama?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: She's really kind and she look after us.

STEVE: Ah, nice.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: So, she takes us to holidays; sometimes she

gives us junk food.

STEVE: Yes?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: So maybe sometimes she gets, like, a

really, like, a sugar, like, a really

sugary smoothie.

STEVE: Oh okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Because when we used to go to holidays to

Gran Canaria she used to buy us, like, there's a place called Taurito, yes, and then she buyed us this, fruit, there's these fruit smoothies. So, it's just, like, fruit in little packets, all kind of flavours. But it's, like, frozen fruit and

then they make smoothies out of them.

STEVE: Okay, and is there anything that you don't

like?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Well, really, I do, I used to really, I

don't know. But I used to, I used to not like, what is it, my mum used to make

sushi, but without rice.

STEVE: Okay, no, I mean, what your mum does, is

there anything that your mum does that you

don't like, other than food?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Well, rea-, I meditate.

STEVE: Do you?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes, I meditate.

STEVE: And do you like that?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes, I meditate but really my mum got upset

about one thing about meditation.

STEVE: Why?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Because she did not know that we eat, I ate

meat or baby meat all this time-

STEVE: Oh okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: -since I was a baby. She never knew.

STEVE: Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: And then I started to meditate when I was

six years old but now I'm nine; I was

meditating for three years now.

Yes, okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

So, but now, but when I, when she found out

about, I eat baby-

STEVE:

Yes.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

-she, because that's why I keep on telling

her I, when I, she did not know, that's why

I keep on telling her, I don't want to

meditate.

STEVE:

Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

I don't, it's really boring. Because I

knew while I'm meditating even, because one

of the rules is not to eat meat or any

dairy.

STEVE:

Right, I see.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Or lie or steal or do anything.

STEVE:

Okay, okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

But then I eat, but because that time my

dad used to learn me to steal money, all

kind of stuff like that.

STEVE:

Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

That's why I used to steal my mum's money

and buy sweets with it.

STEVE:

Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Or sometimes give it to my dad.

STEVE:

Okay. And what about Papa Hemp?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Yes.

STEVE:

What's he like?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

He's kind but when I, but when we were

telling him all about this-

STEVE:

Yes.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

-on holidays in Morocco-

STEVE: Yes.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: -we, because we were scared to tell of

course-

STEVE: Yes.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: -so we lied a bit, we lied a lot though.

STEVE: Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: We lied a lot but then we were so scared

and terrified when they, when he found out

about it. Because even the first time it's, like, right, 'Alisa and Gabriel, somebody's touching you and I know it's,

who it is'.

STEVE: He said that to you?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: And I said, and then we just gave up and we

just said 'My dad'.

STEVE: What do you mean, you 'gave up'?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: So, so we're, like, we gave up the, we gave

up the deal with our dad not to tell anyone

about this-

STEVE: Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: -or mum, anyone.

STEVE: Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: And then we just gave up the deal, we just

told him that our dad and then we carry on

telling.

STEVE: Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: But that time we were terrified to tell all

about this-

STEVE: Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: -baby's, baby killing and all this.

STEVE: Yes.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: So then after, so we lied a lot, as I said-

STEVE: Yes.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: -because we were terrified.

STEVE: Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: And we were still. So, but he give us,

her, he didn't hurt us but he got spoons

and gave us, not hard, hard licks-

STEVE: Yes.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: -just gave us just soft licks.

STEVE: Who did?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Abraham.

STEVE: He gave you licks?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Especially so that we could tell, because

we were used to hurting.

STEVE: What do you mean he hit you and gave you

licks?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: No, no, like, we call them licks.

STEVE: Oh, what does that mean?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: So it's like a spoon hit. But it's, like,

it's just a soft one.

STEVE: So Abraham hit you, why did he hit you?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: So that, because we keep on lying, we keep

on lying. But then, because we told him that, the only way that we could tell you

is by him hurting us.

STEVE: You told him that?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes.

STEVE: Or he said that?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: No, no, he, we didn't tell him but he knew

that, because we told him that if we, like,

if we misbehave or, like, like, make a

noise with our dad, he'll give us licks.

STEVE:

Yes.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: But then after Abraham thought it-

STEVE:

Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: -would be a good idea if he could give us,

like, soft ones just like that.

STEVE:

What did he use to do that?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

A spoon.

STEVE:

Okay, what sort of spoon?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

It's just a normal cutlery one-

STEVE:

Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

-which, like, people eat with in

restaurants or anything.

STEVE:

Okay, okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

He didn't hit us so hard, it was soft,

soft.

STEVE:

And what did your mum say about that?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Nothing, nothing, no, nothing. She thought

it was a good idea. Because then after,

when we had licks and we have a water torture which is, we call it a water

torture.

STEVE:

What's that?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

So, he gets loads of jugs of warm water-

STEVE:

Yes.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

-spills it on us, so then after he's like,

he says that he's blessing us so that we

could tell.

STEVE:

Who's that?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN:

Abraham.

STEVE:

Right.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes. So then after he gives us the, and

after we, we were, like, because after,

we're used to hurting.

STEVE: And what's your mum saying when this is

going on?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Nothing, nothing, she doesn't, she doesn't

mind. She thinks it's a good idea to do

that so that we could tell.

STEVE: Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: You know, because we were, we were used to

hitting.

STEVE: Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Whenever he gave us licks, the first time

he wanted to try it out-

STEVE: Yes.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: -he gave just a lick.

STEVE: Yes.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Do you know this?

STEVE: Yes.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: This, this thing it's, like, he didn't do

it on purpose, and then after he

accidentally hit me just here.

STEVE: With what?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: With the spoon, accidentally, it was really

sharp, the spoon.

STEVE: Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: He accidentally done this to me with the

spoon.

STEVE: Right, okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: I forgave him, I didn't mind.

STEVE: Okay.

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A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: But, like, he realised that we did not, me

and Gabriel do not care if we get hit-

STEVE: Okay.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: -because my dad used to hit us all the

time, every single day.

STEVE: Okay. What we'll do, I think we'll have a

little break because you've been speaking for a long time. I'm just going to see how

your mum's getting on and Matt, okay?

All right, do you want to come with me and you can wait in the room and watch a little

bit of telly for five minutes.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: I will just eat some strawberries.

STEVE: Yes, just take-

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Oh, golly[?].

STEVE: Don't worry, we'll tidy it up, don't worry.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Oh.

STEVE: If you have a sit down. What I'd like to

just talk about is, so you was in Morocco?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Yes.

STEVE: So how did, what happened first of all with

Abraham finding out, what did he find out?

STEVE: Why did he have a lot of clues?

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: Once he saw-

STEVE: Yes, go on, tell.

A GAREEVA-DEARMAN: -me and Gabriel just touch each other

anyway.

STEVE: What were you doing touching each other,

what do you mean?
